SHARROW COMMUNITY FORUM

Sharrow Community Forum has been awarded a £2.5 million Youth Investment Fund grant to renovate and extend its youth service offer to young people across Sheffield. It will be used to redevelop their existing Highfield Adventure Playground building into a state of the art environmentally conscious youth hub. Work can start on site in winter 2023/24 and the service should open its doors to young people by late autumn 2024.

PEAKY FINDER

Whether you're new to the district, or you've lived here all your life, I guarantee you'll enjoy a ride on the Stagecoach Peak Sightseer service. Briefly, it's a double decker open topped bus tour of the Peak District, and you can hop on and off as many times as you like. The nearest stop for us is at Baslow, which can easily be reached using the 218 service from outside the Stag. The Sightseer then goes to Calver, Hassop Station, Bakewell, Ashford in the Water, Pilsley, Chatsworth and back to Baslow. The service is daily. The first bus is at ten o'clock, the last at five thirty, and they're every half an hour. The fares are ridiculously cheap - \pounds 6 for an adult, \pounds 4 for a concession or under eighteen, and only \pounds 3 if you're in a party of five. You don't have to book; you can pay the driver as you board. Half the upstairs deck is covered, so you won't get wet, even if it rains.

I've lived around here all my life, and yet I still found it very enjoyable. With the summer holidays coming up, it's a great way to entertain the kids. Go on – give it a go. *Jack Massey*

WOODLAND TRUST Tree of the year 2023

The Chelsea Road elm is in the running to be crowned Tree of the Year 2023.

Conservation charity the Woodland Trust has selected 12 trees across the UK, and the Chelsea Road Elm is one of them. The Trust says that the tree is one of the UK's most famous elms with fewer than 1,000 of the species still standing after Dutch elm disease wiped out over 60 million trees.

The spokesperson said the Sheffield tree was "fortunately resistant" to the disease and was also home to the whiteletter hairstreak butterfly, which had saved it from the chop

during Sheffield City Council's felling programme.

The winning tree is set to represent the UK in the European Tree of the Year competition and would be announced on 19 October, the Woodland Trust said.

UKRAINIAN Stories

Following EDGE's feature on Ukrainian refugees living in this area we were contacted by Richard Machin, senior lecturer in social work and health at Nottingham Trent University informing us of an article he has written about significant areas of concern about longer term support for Ukrainians in this country. He highlights the discrepancies between the 'Homes for Ukraine' and Ukraine Family Scheme, risk of exploitation, homelessness caused by the breakdown in housing schemes and complexities in the welfare benefit scheme. He has also brought our attention to a policy briefing that he has written setting out policy recommendations.

NUMBER 10 & 56 BUS SERVICES

Readers may have noticed that the number 10/10a 'circular' bus has made a surprise comeback since the last edition of EDGE appeared. It is now run by Stagecoach, and early signs are that they are doing a very good job..

It had last run in August 2022, when Powells, who had the contract to run it, suddenly ceased trading. The timetable is almost exactly as it used to be over the stretch between Heeley and Broomhill via Nether Edge and the Hallamshire Hospital, although there have been some slight changes elsewhere.

The return of the service is very welcome, although the South Yorkshire Mayoral Combined Authority (MCA), which is funding it (at substantial expense), has done absolutely nothing to publicise it. This seems extremely shortsighted and won't encourage uptake. I'd like to think this isn't part of the strategy.

Turning to service 56, our link to town, there is very concerning news. The MCA has now invited tenders for the continued operation of evening and Sunday buses from 29 October, and has specified a bus once every two hours in place of the current hourly service. In my view this is so infrequent as to be almost useless. No doubt this is a result of budgetary pressures at the MCA, but a two-hourly service is highly unsatisfactory for Nether Edge and Sharrow - it is surely just one step away from the complete withdrawal



of all evening and Sunday buses along Washington Road, Wostenholm Road and Montgomery Road to Nether Edge. In fact this could be the outcome anyway if the prices exceed the MCA's budget or if there are no bids to operate the service.

Unfortunately there's no escaping the fact that the evening and Sunday 56s are not well used, but they are of great importance to those who do use them – local residents as well as those who work in the area.

At present there appears to be no intention to reduce the weekday daytime service below the present half-hourly timetable, which still carries sufficient passengers to operate without the need for subsidy. The present situation highlights the need for us to support the daytime service – without adequate patronage this could come under threat too.

I have only very recently been alerted to the MCA's intention (it's more than a proposal), and feel it's important to raise it to allow representations to be made at the earliest opportunity. *Bob Telfer, Briar Road*

CARELESS DRIVING

The absolute horror of imagining your child being knocked over by a careless driver is one that I've had to learn to block out from my mind.

If not, I would have denied my children the independence and freedom that they enjoy walking to school or around our neighbourhood by themselves, or with their friends.

I'd be interested to know if anyone has a similar experience to me of heightened anxiety (and actually anger and sadness) at seeing and hearing the increasing number of cars racing around Nether Edge at speeds undeniably higher than the speed limit.

Even more apparent to me on market day when myself and my daughter were walking around the left corner of Montgomery and one of these racers mounted the curb. Had we not heard it coming and been as mobile, I have absolutely no doubt it would've resulted in fatality.

Is there anything currently that others have raised as potential actions in this matter or is already underway, that I can support or others who might have similar concerns? I would be incredibly grateful if you can direct me as for me, this only seems a matter of time and surely It is better that we try now rather than wait until after somebody has died or been seriously injured?

It's not just (in my opinion) those who seek the thrill of the dopamine hit of racing in cars (and don't realise that is just a Russian roulette with poor odds for them and their potential victims) but also, those of us -and I include many of us here -that use mobiles whilst driving or park on double yellows "just to nip in" or sprint to a late meeting thinking there are no cameras. I implore you please stop. None of these are justifiable reasons to risk taking the life of a child.

NENG DISCUSSES LOCAL ISSUES WITH COUNCILLORS

You may not be aware, but the NENG officers (Ken, Ruth, Howard and Richard) have started to have regular meetings every three months with our Nether Edge and Sharrow Councillors. The last meeting was on 2 August with our recently elected councillor lbby Ullah (the others could not make it this time). Here is a summary of what we discussed.

1. NETHER EDGE ACTIVE NEIGHBOURHOOD AND ARCHER LANE CLOSURE

- A decision by the relevant council committee is expected in September (note that none of the NE councillors are on this committee but will be able to make representations)
- The final outcome is bound to disappoint some as residents living close to the road closure appreciate reduced local traffic though others are concerned by resulting increased journey distances, traffic and air pollution elsewhere. NENG is similarly conflicted.
- If Archer Lane is re-opened, it would be important for the Council to consider alternative measures to control traffic / safety on Brincliffe Edge Rd for the future (as SCC funds are critically limited), rather than simply reverting to the pre-closure situation. Howard will re-submit a diagram with suggestions for limited one-way streets in the area.
- If Archer Lane is to remain closed, significant additional costs will be incurred to make Sheldon Road, Madden Road and the junction of Brincliffe Edge with Bannerdale Roads safe.
- Ibby thought the pedestrian crossings at the bottom of Union Rd and across Psalter Lane would be made permanent, but concern was expressed at the dangers (especially for parents with buggies) of crossing Sheldon Rd at the junction with Sandford Grove Road, exacerbated by queuing traffic on Sheldon Rd that limit visibility.

2. SHELDON ROAD TREE OBSTRUCTIONS

- Concerns expressed for safety resulting from the extreme undulation and narrowness of pavements were acknowledged.
- It was considered unacceptable that local residents and disabled persons should have been left for so long having to negotiate a very busy carriageway as it is sometimes impossible to navigate the pavement in a wheelchair or with wheeled articles.
- Ibby confirmed that SCC was aware of the urgency and expected positive proposals for treatment early in the new year.
- Following the street trees scandal, Sheldon Rd seems to be a casualty of SCC reluctance to fell any street trees, regardless of obstruction / inappropriateness of tree species / danger created.

3. NEW POCKET PARK IN NETHER EDGE - MACHON BANK ROAD

- In the light of rejection of funding under the Economic Recovery Fund ("ERF2"), alternative sources of funding for 'heavy labour' elements of the scheme are being sought by NENG
- The granting of a highways licence by SCC for the pocket park is imminent
- Most work will be carried out by NENG volunteers themselves but assistance (ideally by Amey) is needed for cutting up small areas of old tarmac after first ensuring there are no live services beneath. Help may also be needed unloading and constructing heavy sleepers for the perimeter.
- Some precedent for Amey to provide free resource was established on Ryle Road, where a redundant pavement was cut back and replaced by wild-flower planting at Amey's request. Councillors were asked to lobby SCC Highways / Amey for the same to be done for the pocket park, which would relieve Amey of on-going maintenance responsibility once the highways licence was in place.

4. ROADS, SPEEDING AND PARKING

- Concern was expressed at risks from speeding vehicles at various location in Nether Edge. Straight roads such as Montgomery and Rundle Roads were felt to be especially vulnerable, but also elsewhere.
- Could hand held speed cameras operated by residents or 'smiling sid' warnings be provided?

5. NETHER EDGE FESTIVAL - 'Party in the park'

- NENG were worried that similarly impossible conditions might be imposed at short notice for the Festival's Party in the Park to those which scuppered the local scout group's bonfire event last year (eg 30 portable WCs, emergency escape plans - from a public park?)
- Robust health and safety requirements are understandable, but those previously demanded by the Sheffield Safety Advisory Group were unrealistic (30 WCs for a one hour open air event is grossly excessive and the park is big enough for crowds to find safety elsewhere without endangering themselves). Such over-the-top conditions discriminate

against even the best managed voluntary community events.

6. LOCAL AREA COMMITTEE (LAC) Meetings and councillor support

- NENG representatives would be keen to participate in meetings, but the website is not helpful in identifying future venues and dates. Ibby undertook to provide details of upcoming meetings.
- NENG is strictly non-political, but they would be very pleased to publish background council information or non-partisan articles from ward councillors relevant to Nether Edge residents in their monthly EDGE magazine, which is distributed to 1000+ local households
- NENG would like to maintain regular dialogue with their ward councillors so a three-monthly cycle of meetings was agreed.

HOMES FOR HOUSE SPARROWS: Nestbox-making workshop

Come and make a wooden nestbox suitable for sparrows, and other birds such as tits, nuthatches and flycatchers. Garden birds, as well as insects like bees and butterflies, and many other wild creatures, are declining in number, and need our support.



Our survey in 2022 revealed gaps in the sparrow populations locally, so we decided to support the existing colonies

by increasing the places they could nest, and planting wildflowers for their insect food.

We are part of the Nether Edge and Sharrow Sustainable

Transformation (NESST) community group. Our aim is to enhance our green spaces, increase the biodiversity of our area, and combat the effects of the climate crisis. So far, we have run surveys and mapped potential areas for wildlife, organised educational talks and guided walks, planted trees, wildflowers and native hedgerow shrubs, and provided homes for swifts and sparrows! We plan to do more...

From a Humble Seed to a Mighty Tree

We are Ben and Jo, the founders of Yoga Nature (est. 2004). We have academic backgrounds, with degrees ranging from prehistory, eco-sciences, to education, geography, and philosophy. Between us, we have more than 40 years of study into the history and practice of yoga. Additionally, we hold a strong value that health and wellbeing are fundamental in living a full and complete life. Without good health nothing else really matters. Like many Sheffielders we love nature.

It is through our experiences that we have questioned and explored what it means to be a human being, our relationship to other beings and whether our current patriarchal capitalistic model benefits and supports all of us.

We discovered that yoga is a complete and holistic pathway that encompasses our values and beliefs. Neither of us had any intention to teach yoga and if it wasn't for our dear friend Joan setting up our first class we probably wouldn't be here today. You will find that our classes are inspired from our great love of nature and reflect an organic, sensual, gentle, quiet, and inner reflective practice that encourages slow comfortable growth and change in one's body, mind, and actions. It takes time to grow into a mighty Tree!

We define ourselves as a small community yoga school and teach a limited number of adult and primary school classes. We ensure our room rental feeds back into the Sheffield school community and take quite a bit of time off to be outside playing in nature and snorkelling in Greece.

Yoga Nature's ethos is centred around one word "ahimsa" or non-harming. It is a reminder that we are yoga, we are part of nature; and that our lives should reflect this sacred reciprocity. Every breath both on and off the mat helps regenerate a world where all beings are honoured in their sovereignty, loved in their difference, and seen as vital participants in this divine interplay of life.

We have been sharing yoga with NE Festival since the first one in 2015! Dr. Panni Loh




September is East, South-East Asian heritage month set up by the British East, South-East Asian Network in 2020. The first time it will be celebrated in Sheffield is through an exhibition Journeys from the East to Sheffield curated by Nether Edge artist Dr. Panni Loh. The exhibition is kindly hosted by the Arthouse, Sheffield and was opened by Kim Streets, Deputy Lieutenant for South Yorkshire and CEO Sheffield Museums.

Panni is a writer and artist and so sought out others from those disciplines, with heritage from East and South-East Asia to create an exhibition that shows some of the art stories through acrylic paintings, oil paintings, sound tracks, videos, short stories and poems by Dr. Panni Loh, Clara Cheung, John Lau, Mai Mustaphanin, Sophie Mei Lan Malin, Winko, Annie Anthony-Mays, Gum Cheng, Chu Yiu Wai. Their journeys often span generations and countries through sea crossings, flights and many miles on foot from China, Malaysia, Hong Kong, Myanmar and Singapore. There were enthusiastic others whose spirit imbues the exhibition, but summer holidays took them home to the East to visit family.

Journeys from the East to Sheffield is on during the Mid-Autumn Mooncake festival celebrated in the East when the streets are adorned with lanterns including giant lantern temples where people go for blessings. With this in mind Panni is showing her painting "Into the Light" showing us all as lanterns of light seeking more light.

The exhibition is open from September 1st-30th: Mondays -Fridays 10-5pm and Saturday 10-4. The Arthouse Sheffield S1 4HU







It's been five years since I sent a tentative email to see if I could volunteer at the General Cemetery, the historic burial ground in Sharrow. We had just moved to Sheffield and I was looking to meet new friends. Surely the sort of people who choose to work and volunteer at a tumbling, overgrown Victorian boneyard would be my right up my street? I wasn't disappointed.

Since then a lot has changed. Back then, the Trust was in trouble and two permanent members of staff were at risk of redundancy. I sat with the rest of the volunteers in many uncomfortable meetings and was struck by the shared passion for the site. Thankfully, a kind donation arrived in time and the Trust could move forward with new trustees and volunteers. The same year, Sheffield City Council was awarded £3.8 million from the joint National Lottery Heritage Fund/ National Lottery Community Fund Parks to launch a programme of extensive repairs and conservation works. It also included an activity scheme to help more people find out about what makes our Cemetery so special as a public park rich in heritage and biodiversity. That project has now come to an end, and we are very proud of the work that has been done.

Walls and monuments have been lovingly repaired and original paths and sightlines have been reinstated to Robert Marnock's original designs. This has been a very careful and sympathetic restoration while maintaining the Cemetery's unique atmosphere as a romantic, meandering wilderness. The contractors only left in June this year, but Mother Nature is doing her thing and the place is already bursting with knee-high wildflowers and grasses. The community have their quiet place back and because of the intricate and complex repair work, it's protected for future generations to enjoy.

Right in the centre of the Cemetery is our event space, The Samuel Worth Chapel. It's a Nonconformist funeral chapel built in 1836 with stark white walls, dramatic trapezoid windows and an impossibly high ceiling. When it's illuminated for events, it looks otherworldly as it comes into view as you walk up the valley. I'm a big fan. Can you tell?

In 2022 the Chapel was awarded a premises licence which means that we can host all kinds of events to raise money for our site and help fund our research into the lives of the 87,000 people buried here. Take a look at https://gencem.org/whats-on/ to see the diverse range of events and activities we host. We even have a wedding licence and soon will be hosting a ceremony for a couple who met at one of our events. That warms my cockles.

We've come a long way since 2018 but the passion remains. If you've just moved to Sheffield and you're looking to meet new people who are interested in history, community, conservation and much more, get in touch via volunteering@gencem.org. It worked for me.
